On behalf of ISANA members I take this opportunity to thank the immediate Past President, Mary Ann Seow for her drive and commitment to support members in their engagement with international students with personal support and delivery of the best possible student experience. Mary Ann assisted me and Council through the hand-over period and has continued to provide invaluable and ongoing support.

I also acknowledge Angela Leota-Hughes' contribution to the ISANA National Council and as NSW/ACT Branch President and Vice-President. Angela's contribution at both National and State level have been greatly appreciated and we are sad to see her leave both roles.

Activities

As in past years ISANA continued to serve members via their State Branches with representation at State conferences and events; the delivery of best-practice and 'coal-face' professional development opportunities; and member networking sessions. I encourage you to read each of the Branch reports attached to this Annual Report to see the breadth of work being undertaken.

ISANA receives various invitations and opportunities to deliver submissions on behalf of members. In 2018 we made a submission to the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade on the *Soft Power Review* and are in the process of contributing to the Legal and Constitutional Affairs References

Committee on the *Effectiveness of the current temporary skilled visa system in targeting genuine skills shortages* and to the Council for International Education's Expert Members on *Growing International Education in Regional Australia*.



ISANA responds to media enquiries from the ABC, SBS and the PIE News commenting on international student issues and we are continuing to grow our social media footprint on Facebook, Linked In and Twitter.

Collaborations

ISANA has continued to work closely with the Council of International Students Australia (CISA) and I am happy to report that our long-awaited Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed on the 25 September 2018. A copy of the MOU can be found on the ISANA webpage under the 'Student' tab.

As in past years, CISA asked the President of ISANA to be the Returning Officer for their Elections held in June. It was a great opportunity for me to meet both the outgoing and incoming CISA Council members. The ongoing development and mentoring of student leaders is a key activity for ISANA as we work closely alongside peak bodies, government agencies and members to ensure that CISA will remain an independent strong voice for international students in Australia.

ISANA was invited to join the newly formed *International Student Experience – Association Roundtable* which was established under the leadership of IEAA to bring together over 12 peak bodies to collaborate and join voices to explore themes and priorities related to the international student experience. Two meetings have been held to date in Melbourne and Brisbane and the last for the year will be held in Sydney immediately prior to the National ISANA Conference.

Grants

National Code Tutorial: In late 2017 ISANA submitted and was successful in securing an Enabling Growth and Innovation Grant (EGI) valued at \$128,233 to develop and deliver an updated instructional tool for international education professionals to understand and meet their obligations under the National Code 2018. Work has commenced on the Project and the new Tutorial release date is scheduled during the first quarter of 2019.

ISANA is also a major Stakeholder in the Universities Australia EGI grant *International University Students and Pre-departure information: What are they getting and what do they need?* This project will document the perspectives of pre-departure information currently provided to international university students and seek to showcase best practice examples related to providing useful and culturally appropriate pre-departure information.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This year ISANA has been exceptionally successful in gaining government funding for projects that will directly benefit students and the staff who work with them.

Details of the grants as follows:

Australian Government Enabling Growth and Innovation Program (EGI):

\$128,223 Online Tutorial for 2018 National Code of Practice for Providers of Education and Training to Overseas Students

Victorian Government Department of Economic Development, Jobs, Transport and Resources:

\$58,500	Be You Be Scene
\$45,480	Contact Points: Enabling international students during critical incidents
\$29,750	VicWISE Employability: Professional Networking meetings for students
\$5,000	Sponsorship for students to attend Vic-Tas Conference

Queensland International Education and Training Partnership Fund:

\$9,900 Project Global Citizen

This came to a total of \$276,853. My congratulations go to all the ISANA members whose hard work has resulted in these successful grants. Some of this funding was received in the 2017-2018 financial year, with the balance to follow in early to mid-2019. Since these funds will be expended over the next financial year, the moneys receipted to 30 September have been listed under Current Liabilities: Unexpended Grant Funding.

ISANA opened the financial year with \$128,303. Total revenue for 2018, including project grant funding, was \$237,334. This included the income from all professional development activities run by State Branches and last year's National Conference profit. After deducting all costs associated with Professional Development, ISANA had a Gross Profit of \$57,651 from revenue-generating activities.

Operating costs were slightly higher than in 2017 due to the expenditure required to prepare for the EGI grant. This resulted in an overall deficit for this year of \$1,549. Having factored in the current liabilities, ISANA ended the 2017-2018 financial year with net assets of \$120,059.

In closing, I want to extend my very great thanks to Phoebe Thiessen for her invaluable support, exceptional good humour and willingness to go the extra mile in her efficient administration of the ISANA accounts.

QUEENSLAND

2018 was a busy year for our members with updates to the National Code to implement and many changes in the International Education market.

Our QLD Committee engaged in a joint project Alphacrane and CTC Consulting and the consortium was awarded funding from Trade Investment Queensland. This project was funded by International Education and Training Partnership Fund.

A little about the Global International Education Survey

Study Queensland has announced a ground-breaking approach to on-boarding international students and optimising their experience in Australia, with the newly launched Project Global Citizen.

The 2018 Project Global Citizen Survey will measure the cultural challenges that international students encounter during their studies in Queensland. These key survey findings will be shared with participating international education industry professionals and members of ISANA International Education Association to enhance their delivery of services to international students.

2018 was also the first year that we have had a Regional Rep in North QLD. Tori was instrumental in setting up the workshop in Cairns. Workshop in Cairns

Small number of members and nonmembers took part in a workshop delivered by Mary Ann Seow on Critical incidents. Feedback was very positive and in 2019 QLD Branch will organise a workshop in Townsville with hopes to arrange a session in Toowoomba to reach out to the Regional members.

Topics covered this year: Networking and CISA event, Under 18s welfare, Blue card Compliance, Critical Incident Management, Global Citizen and Employability

We had a good turnout for an Under 18s Welfare and Compliance half day session in May showing this is an area of ongoing interest. It would be beneficial to hold these again in the future as either a full day, or two separate sessions. The Under 18s component was rushed and the compliance topic was in need of a government representative for in-depth knowledge of the requirements.

Last workshop for 2018 will be held in November and will incorporate end of year drinks and a networking opportunity to meet new people and other members. We will also be highlighting some great initiatives for International student engagement. All members are welcome to attend.

The year will round off with the National Conference being held in Sydney and I trust that many people will be able to attend from QLD and regional areas.

Focus for 2019 will be on the National Conference, developing partnerships with local businesses and promoting ISANA to potential sponsors. We are also hoping to hold workshops in Townsville and Toowoomba to provide opportunities for our regional members to be included in the network.

ISANA VIC/TAS is a member of Victorian Schools International Group (VSIG). The group brings together representatives from Catholic, government and independent schools, the City of Melbourne and the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority. The group meets once every 6 months.

Women Leadership Forum- CISA/Study Melbourne

ISANA VIC/TAS is partnering with CISA, Study Melbourne to help organise a Women Leadership Forum in Victoria in March 2019.

Dinner Project

ISANA VIC/TAS is partnering with The Welcome Dinner Project. This is an initial platform to spark connections, between people/international students who are new to Australia with established community members over a shared meal in someone's home or a trusted community space. Everyone brings a plate of food to share. This is a powerful way to build trust, belonging and connection between people and break through cultural, social and other barriers, as they share food and stories.

Collaborating with Other Partners

Education Providers/ Student Associations

Be you- Be scene (Extension of She will be Right) new stories, new students will be joining the workshop. This show will be rolled out in to the regional and metro universities/ Tafe /private colleges in regional Victoria. Discussions are taking place to run the workshops in Geelong and Bendigo and the private colleges.

Legal

ISANA VIC/TAS has been working closely with Inner Melbourne Community Legal and Paper Giant a research and design company to provide support to build a free tool to help international students living in Victoria get quick, free and confidential access to legal information. This is a Study Melbourne initiative and it is currently being developed.

Global Mental Youth Health forum

ISANA VIC/TAS has been invited to be part of an advisory steering committee to assist in planning the Global Mental Youth Health forum in Victoria, partnering with White Ribbon Australia, Global Goodwill Ambassadors, Try Australia and Progressive Care Solution. Being a youth forum, ISANA VIC/TAS has nominated potential international students to join some of the sub working groups and participate in the forum in October.



Student Volunteers

ISANA VIC/TAS continues to function as a productive branch due to the loyalty and drive of 20 student volunteers. They are the glue and they bring an enormous amount of passion and talent to support the branch behind the scene. These students meet during lunch, after hours and weekends to manage the many activities that the branch is involved in. In turn these students are mentored and supported by the 14 highly skilled committee members who come from a diverse set of background in the international sector. Students have a sense of belonging and through volunteering with ISANA have been able to find paid roles with the various projects we are involved in. This strong networking platform has also enabled some of the volunteers to gain full time employment upon graduation

International Leadership Conference RMIT

ISANA VIC/TAS took a booth and received 55 enquiries for volunteering positions by domestic / international combined. The Branch organised a meet and greet for these students to identify potential volunteers for 2019.

NEW ZEALAND

Writing a President's report for this AGM has been a challenge as there has been so much to write about. In 2017 we elected a very strong and capable executive. The variety of sector and location representation has been invaluable in informing and helping our work, and it's been encouraging to see the various contributions of ISANA members, including those on the Executive. A very significant feature for this past year has been the roles of International Student Wellbeing Strategy Project Coordinator, Caroline Stevenson, and Professional Development and Research Coordinator, Chris Beard. Caroline and Chris have worked excellently together, and it's been a pleasure to see the effects of their work. I have included a paragraph of their reflections on these roles and the work they have been doing with ISANA NZ as part of the International Student Well-being Strategy Project that ISANA NZ has been contracted for.

I would also like to record with gratitude the invaluable support and work Victoria Sibley-Bentley, our ISANA NZ Secretariat has done in supporting our association. Supporting the work of the Executive, various working groups, fielding and distributing enquiries and handling day to day financial activity as well as many extra demands afforded by our increased involvement with government agencies and the International Student Well-being Strategy project have amounted to varied and at time pressured work for Victoria, which she has handled with grace and calmness. Thank you, Victoria. This year, Ru Oakley came on board to help us with accounting support and preparation of accounts. Ru is helping us with the transition from accountabilities of a small association to that of a peak body in the financial area and that has included GST registration and associated accountabilities, as these had become necessary due to finances being provided from the Ministry of Education under the International Student Well- being Strategy.

International Student Well-being Strategy projects

ISANA NZ was contracted by the Ministry of Education to deliver a fulsome programme of enhanced professional development and community engagement training. The proposal put to the Ministry, contained forward thinking elements drawn from our ISANA NZ review and roadmap, undertaken earlier. \$152,000 was granted towards this project and as part of the agreed proposal we were able to contract Caroline Stevenson and Chris Beard to roles in implementing this project. I asked Chris and Caroline to record a paragraph of their reflections for this report:

Chris Beard - Professional Development and Research Coordinator

It has been a privilege to work in the Professional Development and Research Coordinator's role in 2018. The opportunity to meet ISANA NZ members and workshop members throughout New Zealand has provided a window into the expertise and hard work that supports international students and sustains the international education sector. One of the strengths of ISANA NZ, continues to be its facilitative hub work, which enables the sharing and propagating of good practice. We've been encouraged by the positive evaluations from participants in the professional development and community engagement workshops and are using the helpful comments and suggestions to develop our offerings moving forward. We have become aware of the immense needs on the frontline and have been working, liaising and coordinating to spearhead efforts to professionalise the sector. This involves collaboration with stake-holders, government agencies, practitioners and academics, which this year has culminated in ISANA NZ's inaugural *International student experience: Connecting research with practice* symposium. I believe we are tantalisingly close to step-changes in the sector



that champion evidence-based practice, clearer professional pathways and dedicated research work. ISANA NZ is uniquely placed to support these changes and develop its products and services accordingly. Finally, it's been a pleasure to work with our ISWS Coordinator Caroline Stevenson and I wish to thank the ISANA NZ Executive and membership for its generous support.

Caroline Stevenson - International Student Wellbeing Strategy Project Coordinator

Coordinating the Professional Development and Community Engagement Days so far has been extremely interesting and rewarding. I have found every region has their own set of challenges and needs in the international education industry. Some institutions are more connected with each other and the community in areas where others are looking to become more unified in the regional approach to international student wellbeing. What I have found that is the same around the country, is the passion and commitment to provide the best pastoral care and experiences possible for our international students, and also how open everyone is to share their ideas, good practice and the issues being faced. These workshops provide a positive day where attendees can learn, network and reflect. Attendees are sharing their voice with ISANA NZ so that we can keep providing the necessary support the industry is needing.

Working with Caroline and Chris has been a feature of the President's role this year and it has been invaluable to be part of the work they have been implementing. It has been a dream of ISANA NZ to lift our contribution from the limits of our capacity to volunteer, to provide professional organisation and presentation to ISANA NZ activities that contribute to enhancing and supporting the work of all who work on the supply side of New Zealand's international education sector.

Through the work of the team involved with the ISWS projects, and Chris and Caroline in particular, we have been able to build through partnerships some very worthwhile initiatives.

Partnering has been a Feature:

This year has been characterised by partnerships that have been beneficial to ISANA NZ in our work and the various roles we perform. I would like to record the value of our partnering with government agencies. The Ministry of Education - international unit, Education New Zealand, MBIE (immigration NZ) and NZQA have regularly contributed to our programmes and provided encouragement, and we too in some small way may have been of assistance to them in their work, as the involvement of our members in consultations and committees is often a hidden contribution of ISANA NZ. Thank you to all our members who have been helpful to government agencies on our behalf. It's been good, feeling the sense of inclusion and appreciation for the work of ISANA NZ, by those who work for the government. ISANA NZ is recognised as one of the peak bodies contributing in New Zealand's international education stream. We are unique as we represent the often diverse and frequently unified view of those who work at the "coalface" so to speak. Representing ISANA NZ as your President in the Education Ministers International Education Stakeholders Advisory group has opened my eyes to the esteem attributed to those who work hard in support. Being part of the excellent ISANA NZ team that contributed to the NZQA developing robust guidelines to the Code has been great. Helping to put together ISANA NZ submissions on a variety of government agency consultations has given me insight and appreciation of the significant contribution our members make to assist the work of our government agencies.

Our partnerships however, have not been limited to government agencies. During 2018, partnership with other organisations working in areas of international education has grown. We have



contributed, but they too have contributed to our programmes and I need to record the great value we have obtained from amongst the Education providers, and I would like to single out EIT, NMIT, IPU, Waikato University and Victoria University of Wellington who have provided venues and assistance for our professional development and community engagement training days. Education NZ, Marsh- Allianz and Unicare have provided sponsorship and help for events. ISMNZ has helped me immensely in the President's role by giving me supported time for that and continuing to supply office space for our secretariat.

Coordinating with other agencies where our paths and interest coincide has also been helpful and I would be remiss not to mention Christchurch Education, Southland Ventures, Tauranga Educated and Learning Hawkes Bay, as regional education groups who have worked together with us both practically and in terms of contributing invaluable ideas and advice. SIEBA has also been a regular connect and late last year our partnership with NZTEAP, ANZSSA and ATLANZ resulted in a very useful joint event. Wintech has also been a great partner to work with in providing the Mental Health First Aid training under the ISWS project.

All of this means there has been a lot of communication needed, and Caroline and Chris being available to represent ISANA NZ has helped. But also, the increased activity has put pressure on the secretariat in terms of keeping up. We are currently reviewing our need to increase the administrative support to ensure our Executive and membership are supported.

So, a busy year and what of the future? A proverb says, "it is because of ignorance man is greatly troubled by the future". We will face some significant decisions going into this coming year. We hope to continue with the momentum gained from the ISWS project. However, we have no funding from the ISWS source for the next year. Our planning envisioned the work being undertaken this last year, fitting into a continuing development going forward. We want to continue the momentum gained and this has been recognised by the government agencies charged with implementing the International Education Strategy. ISANA NZ has been recognised as having a role to play in various parts of the implementation. We are entering discussion with the various government agencies, and as I write, we are in the process of putting together an expression of interest related to how we might be able to contribute. Naturally, such an expression would of necessity ask for assistance with funding. Thoughts and ideas from members are welcome and it is hoped we will be able to report back on gaining funds to assist in our role in professionalising the sector, as well as in carrying on the work of helping to strengthen international education in the regions.

It is too early to report the next stage of plans for next year, but we can say there will be more work in regional clusters and professional development, as well as a two-day ISANA NZ conference focussed in the area of the professionalization of our international education roles. More about that later, as details come into perspective.

In finishing this report, I would like to thank my colleagues on the Executive. They have a variety of strengths and qualities that have blended well and their collective wisdom has been great for our association. I wish them and all our members a very happy and relaxed summer with some holiday and ideally, some good Christmas gifts.
